NEIGHBORHOOD SPOTLIGHT

LINCOLN PARK NEIGHBORHOOD

Jennifer Aholt is President of Lincoln Park Neighborhood Association.

Where is Lincoln Park located?

We are bordered by 3rd St. on the west, 8th St. on the east, Black St. on the north and the north side of North Grand is our southern border. We are just south of Lincoln Park.

What makes Lincoln Park great?

We are what folks imagine when they think of a neighborhood and its' positive attributes. We know each other's names and sincerely care about one another. Our homes are shaded by 100 year old trees, allowing us to rake and bag leaves together. There will be a neighbor clearing the sidewalks in a big snow, another few dedicated to picking up trash, and a willing ear if we just need a friend on a walk. We have all types of homes. There is a mansion that has been turned into the Rippon Kinsella Bed & Breakfast, painted ladies (Victorian homes painted in vibrant colors), and modest homes built by the working families of the old Watch Factory all mingled together.

What are some of the issues with which you struggle?

North Grand's transitional state has brought its own set of struggles. We have business owners that we hope will have a lasting business and some that do not bring the positive commerce we would prefer. The other issue, which may be shared among many neighborhoods, is the gum ball trees! They provide amazing shade, but wow are they EVERbearing!

In what activities is the neighborhood association involved?

We have been working with the city, business owners, and our neighbors to the south, Enos Park, on a North Grand improvement effort over the past few years. We are ready to go forward with an implementable plan to seek TIF funds. Opening the Original Gates of Oak Ridge Cemetery was initiated by the \$25,000 allocated to LPNA by Representative Raymond Poe. We just hosted an Aldermanic forum with our two strong candidates, and help course marshalling the Lincoln Half Marathon, Abe's Amble, and the Moonlight Marathon that all touch our neighborhood. We also coordinate clean up days, "parknics" in Lincoln Park, chili cookoffs and Historic Home Tours.

How would you like to see the neighborhood evolve in the next few years?

Having a determined direction from Benedictine would help set course, but as it stands, the approach for non-traditional students is a positive for our area. Having a stronger commitment to the neighborhood association from more residents would help to expand our momentum.

Sangamon County Curb Your Car Challenge May 11th – 16th, 2015

This will be the 8th Curb Your Car Challenge to commuters in Sangamon County. Places of employment are encouraged to enter the challenge as a team. Employees who leave their cars at home and instead bike, walk, run, or take the bus to work during the week of May 11th – 16th are counted as team participants. Three team awards are given based on size of registered places of employment: 5-49 employees, 50-299 employees, and 300+ employees. Teams with the highest percentage of employees curbing their car at least one day of the challenge week are deemed the winners. Winning teams receive a traveling trophy and a gift certificate for dinner for two at Maldaner's Restaurant.

Incentives and Encouragement:

Each team must have a team leader who is responsible for registering the team, communicating with employees regarding the event, and motivating employees to participate. The Curb Your Car Committee and local sponsors also provide incentives and encouragement to participate.

Free Stuff:

- A Curb Your Car Passport encourages participants to bike, walk, run, or take the bus to nine
 locations where their passport will be stamped. A participant with 1-6 stamps receives a free
 cookie from Café Moxo while passports with 7 or more stamps are good for a free lunch from Café
 Moxo.
- Grab-A-Java will give a coupon for a free cup of coffee to passport holders.
- Prize drawings will held to award participants with gifts from our many sponsors.

Support:

- A group commute bicycle ride will be held on Wednesday, May 13th. Led by the Springfield Bicycle Club, the ride will start at Washington Park at 7:30 AM and end at the Old Capitol Farmer's Market in downtown Springfield.
- · Grab-A-Java will provide water stations at each of their drive-through coffee shops.
- The Springfield Mass Transit District will provide free rides to passengers with bicycles.
